Biographical Notes

Payam Akhavan is presently a Senior Fellow at Yale University, a member of the New York bar, and counsel to sovereigns before international courts and tribunals. He was previously Legal Advisor to the Prosecutor's Office of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia at the Hague, and advisor on transitional justice in Cambodia, Guatemala, East Timor, Peru, Rwanda, and Uganda. He has published extensively on international law and human rights.

Will C. van den Hoonaard is Professor of Sociology and Assistant Dean of Graduate Studies at the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, Canada. He wrote *The Origins of the Bahá'i Community of Canada, 1898-1948* (Wilfrid Laurier University Press, 1996) and has co-authored, with Dr. Deborah K. van den Hoonaard, a work on the equality of women and men in the Canadian Baha'i Community (Kalimat Press, forthcoming). He is a Member of the Canadian Interagency Advisory Panel on Research Ethics and is Chair of its Social Sciences and Humanities Working Committee.

Thomas Linard read theology in the University of Strasbourg, France, before converting to the Baha'i Faith. He teaches computer skills in a non-profit organization, and has published various materials regarding the history of the Baha'i Faith in France

Robin Mahrshahi holds a BS in Chiropractic Science from Macquarie University, Sydney, where he is currently an honours student in Biological Sciences.

Kavian Milani is a practising physician in the United States with specialty training in Family Medicine. He is currently an MA candidate in history at George Mason University. His areas of interest and research include early Babi history, nineteenth-century Iranian history, and the Iranian Constitutional Revolution. He is the co-discoverer of the earliest known version of the controversial history *Nuqtatu'l-kaf*.

Brian Miller received his PhD in Arabic literature and Near Eastern Studies from the University of California, Berkeley in 2000. He is an independent scholar working in Santa Cruz, California.

Moojan Momen is the editor of the *Baha'i Studies Review*.
